"Come to me, all you who are weary, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28)

A couple of days after our return I was still very 'jet-lagged' and feeling I needed another holiday to recover! I went into the church for something and found myself just sitting in the quiet. It was cool and so peaceful, which was just what I needed. Silent retreats are anathema to my personality generally but this solitary quiet was restorative. As I sat there I thought about the hustle and bustle of the church on a Sunday morning. I thought about all the folk that make up the Body of Christ in Kirkliston and how I am so blessed to be a part of that Body. 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Vandalism

The Church & church halls have been targeted by vandals lately. Eight of the security lights round the building were destroyed by someone using a rod, thin enough to go through the weldmesh cages.

It has cost the church £2,000 to repair the damage.

Youths have been climbing up the drain-pipes of both Church & Centre and scrambling up the slates, dislodging them. – Another £130 to sort.

We appeal to anyone seeing damage being done to our Church premises to alert the police. We intend to apply anti vandal paint to vulnerable drain pipes, rhones etc. & to apply other security measures suggested by the police.

Company Section Summer Camp FDF Julsolejr 2006

Four members of the Company Section, David Ritchie, Douglas Stephens, Grant Flannigan and Christopher Cameron travelled to Denmark this summer with the Captain, and Simon Petrie, an Officer in the 44th Edinburgh BB.

We were guests of FDF Storvorde-

Sejlfloed at the FDF's quinquennial National camp at Sletten on the shores of Loch Julsø. FDF is a kindred organisation of the Boys' Brigade, which operates within the national Lutheran Church and was founded in Copenhagen in 1902, having been inspired by the BB. They have a tradition of inviting other members of the Global Fellowship of Christian Youth (formerly World Conference of the Boys' Brigade) to participate in their National Camps, and this year's camp had representatives of 17 different countries amongst the 13,000 participants.

Although in close fellowship with the BB around the world, the FDF is quite different in many ways from our traditional BB Companies – but all were very keen to learn about how we do things as well as to show us their ways.

The local group with which we were partnered are one of the largest in Denmark; and welcomed us as their own. We spent the first few days (in extremely warm temperatures) building our camp from logs, rope and tarpaulin. We slept in tents, but built everything else in situ (including a food preparation area and dining table to seat 60). We even had a bathroom and hot shower (with water heated via a coil in the chimney of the wood-burning stove). While our Captain and

older Boys took to the pioneering with enthusiasm – and were patiently instructed by the FDFers; the younger Boys were taken swimming by younger FDF members.

During the camp, we were put into small groups (patrols) with others the same age, and had to complete a number of tasks or challenges. At other times, there were many optional activities to sign up for, there was a swimming pool, and water park (with flumes built from logs and tarpaulin; and a big plastic pipe) on site. One day, when we had free time, we climbed to the summit of Denmark's highest peak, Himmelberget – which at around 450' is not quite a Munro, but offers a nice walk and splendid views of the Julsø.

The theme of the camp was "New Sides", and the morning Services carried this theme throughout. Most mornings, the patrols were given questions on the theme of the service to discuss. The large lejråler ("campfire shows") also carried the same theme. The Sunday Service was a communion service, which was attended by a number of visitors; swelling the "congregation" to over 20,000! All the lejråler, and the large services were translated simultaneously into English, and transmitted via FM radio, so we could take a

full part (the small morning services were all in Danish, so relied upon the Captain knowing the stories and being able to give a brief synopsis to the Boys!).

Everybody was very interested to hear about the BB and about Scotland, and the Boys were in demand to go to other groups for coffee or pancakes in the evenings and tell the Danes about Scotland. We also had a couple of opportunities, along with the 1st Bearsden Company to teach some Scottish Country Dancing to the Danes and other international participants (including a large group of Hungarians).

After camp, we were invited to spend 2 days in Storvorde-Sejlfod; a pair of small towns in northern Jutland, where we were impressed by the FDF company's headquarters and facilities

there and enjoyed typical Jutland hospitality staying in people's homes. As a result of our partnership, FDF Storvorde-Sejlfod are already making plans to come to Scotland to visit us in 2008, and our Senior Boys fully intend to return to the next Julsølejr in 2011 (by which time they'll be Officers!). We may also get a visit next year from FDF Hjallerup; one of the Companies who had us for Coffee. All have benefited greatly from the experience; and have learned some new skills, and made new friends. We are indebted to Simon, without whom we couldn't have travelled; and to FDF Storvorde-Sejlfod who's friendship, generosity and hospitality helped ensure that we felt as much a part of the camp as the Danish participants.
